

MORGAN MADE ONE CHARITABLE BEQUEST

Sons to Share Equally in Estate;
Will Provides for Servants

MINEOLA, N. Y., March 26.—P.—Commander Junius Spencer Morgan, now on overseas navy duty, and Lieut. Cmdr. Henry Sturgis Morgan, sons of John Pierpont Morgan, will share equally in his residuary estate under terms of the will filed for probate today. No estimate of the estate's size was given.

The financier, who died March 13 at Boca Grande, Fla., made provisions for his children, nephews and nieces, and provided generously for a long list of servants and employes, both in America and England.

Only one charitable bequest was made—to St. John's Episcopal Church of Lattingtown, Locust Valley, N. Y., where the 75-year-old banker was senior warden and where he often passed the collection plate.

The church was left \$150,000, the income to be paid to the church.

Morgan explained the lack of other charitable bequests in his will as follows:

"As throughout my life I have been in the habit, to the extent of my ability, of making donations to the various benevolent, religious and educational objects in which I have taken much interest, I make no further bequest for such purposes."

The will directed that \$25,000 be paid to each of his children, the two sons and his two daughters, Jane Norton Nichols and Frances Tracy Pennoyer. No further provision was made for the two daughters, "having during my lifetime made provision" for them, the will stated.
